

STIRLING COUNCIL OPEN DATA POLICY

1 SUMMARY

- 1.1 Stirling Council aspires to be as open as possible with its citizens. This fundamental objective goes beyond our legal responsibilities. It takes us towards a culture where we share data held by the Council in a way that allows our citizens to discover, compare and interact with it.
- 1.2 Open Data is a way of achieving this. By working from the principles in this policy we will establish a new openness with our citizens, encourage improvement in our services and the building blocks for innovation to make life better for all.
- 1.3 The Open Data Policy commits Stirling Council to 5 core principles in relation to how we manage and share our data for the benefit of all. These principles are detailed in the Stirling Council Open Data Policy attached as Appendix 3.

2 OFFICER RECOMMENDATION(S)

The Committee agrees:-

- 2.1 to adopt the Stirling Council Open Data Policy as attached; and
- 2.2 that Stirling Council adopts the 5 star deployment scheme detailed in the policy which commits the Council to reach 3 star level within one year of publication of the policy and 4 star within 2.

3 CONSIDERATIONS

- 3.1 Open Data promotes accountability and good governance, enhances public debate and helps to combat corruption by;
 - 3.1.1 showing how and where public money is spent, providing strong incentives for that money to be used most effectively; and
 - 3.1.2 enabling people to make better informed choices about the services they receive and the standards they should expect.

- 3.2 Freely-available government data can be used in innovative ways as a catalyst for innovation in the private sector, supporting the creation of new markets, businesses, and jobs. These benefits can multiply as more businesses adopt open data practices modelled by government and share their own data with the public.
- 3.3 A report by the European Commission estimates that overall economic gains from opening up this resource could amount to €40 billion a year in the EU. Opening up public data will also foster the participation of citizens in political and social life and contribute to policy areas such as the environment.
- 3.4 The 2009 Digital Britain Report described data as ‘an innovation currency’ and ‘the lifeblood of the knowledge economy’¹. An Open Data policy provides the information support delivery of several of Stirling Council’s Strategic Priorities most notably our commitment to:-
- 3.4.1 Pursue a diverse high wage economy that delivers local jobs for people across Stirling;
 - 3.4.2 Regenerate our most in need communities to deliver a full range of positive social, environmental and economic outcomes; and
 - 3.4.3 Examine and deliver on more opportunities for improved models of service delivery.
- 3.5 The Scottish Government Data Management Board establishes 10 guiding principles that will deliver their vision for Scotland. Two of these are particularly relevant in the context of open data:
- **Availability:** Make public service data (historic and current) available and readily discoverable, in formats which are easily re-used (e.g. machine readable). This will allow and encourage others to make re-use of the data to develop new products and services. In turn, this will create wealth and jobs, as well as better services for people in Scotland
 - **Innovation:** Support effective and timely research that brings different data sets together easily and with minimal bureaucracy. This will enable more responsive service development, contribute to Scotland’s reputation for research and development, attract business and make Scotland the “come to place” for innovation in data science and analysis.
- 3.6 Building upon the ambitions expressed at national and international levels we therefore propose to follow a set of **principles** that will be the foundation for access to, and the release and re-use of, data made available by Stirling Council.
